SECTION A - READING (10 marks)

Q.1. Read the passage given below.

- 1. The society we live in is a very materialistic one. It easily judges a person on his/her physical attributes and forms a preconceived notion about that person. Forget the needy, society refuses to accept a person who looks, walks or even talks differently. However, if you flip through the pages of history, various individuals with disability have proved that disability is just a state of mind. Several differently abled-persons have made us proud with their exceptional feats at international level.
- 2. An internationally acclaimed para-fencing player, Rakhal was diagnosed with polio from birth. Despite his physical deformities, he was always inclined towards sports especially cricket. At 18, he secretly fled from his village and came to Bhubaneswar to earn his livelihood. Known for his flamboyant batting skills, he was also a part of the Odisha disability cricket team. He fell in love with fencing when he saw it for the first time. Thereafter, he took up the sport and went ahead to become a national champion five times. He has played 2 world cups and 2 world championships, Asian Championship and Asian Games once each. He has won 34 national medals and is working hard to win a medal for his country at Busan Paralympics 2024. He is an avid blood donor and has been training young para-fencers of the state.
- 3. Born to a poor farmer in Puri district, Pravat has overcome numerous adversities in life to emerge as an international badminton champion. Pravat took up badminton at a very young age. With no professional facilities in his

village, he honed his skills by watching YouTube videos. He tasted international success when he won a silver medal in Badminton singles at special Olympics World Summer Games, Abu Dhabi in 2019. Pravat suffers from multiple disabilities and aims to coach young players for the future tournaments.

- 4. Sunil Pradhan is a para-badminton doubles champion. Born in Cuttack, Sunil was good at cricket and badminton since his school days. He never knew about para badminton until he got a surprise call to join a selection-cum-coaching camp at Angul in 2008. Not only did he immediately join the camp but he also impressed the selectors there. After a year of rigorous training, Sunil took part in the National Para-badminton championship at Bangalore wining doubles gold and singles bronze. Since then, he has never looked back. Sunil who suffers from dwarfism, is currently recuperating from a nagging thigh injury that he picked up two years ago. He is planning to make a comeback to the competitive sport soon and is eying to win a medal at the Busan Asian Games 2022.
- 5. Let us take a moment and salute these players who have made us proud time and again with their sporting talent and abilities. These players continue to remain as role-models for us proving that if you are strong-willed in life, sky is the limit.



Q.2. Read the following excerpt from a case study titled *Geography matters more than Education in Multilingualism*. (5)

- It is rather astounding to know that a non-literate Goan might actually be multilingual as compared to city graduates in many of the states, including Chhattisgarh, Rajasthan or Bihar. This, however, doesn't mean that those who are literate aren't multilingual. The percentage of multilingual people keeps skyrocketing with higher levels of education both nationally and regionally. Geography plays a significant role in determining the multilingualism of a person.
- 2. State-wise data from Census 2011 on multilingualism and levels of education shows that some states consistently have higher proportions of multilingual persons at all levels of education. Goa has the highest number of bilinguals and trilinguals. Therefore, more than half the non-literate population is found to be bilingual in Goa.
- 3. On the other hand, states like Gujarat, Assam, Punjab, Jammu and Kashmir and Maharashtra have a high proportion of multilingual in their population, irrespective of the level of education whereas Chhattisgarh, Rajasthan, Madhya Pradesh, Bihar, Uttar Pradesh and West Bengal have a lower proportion of multilingual at any level of education, comparatively. Education does make a difference to multilingualism in varying degrees.
- 4. South India sees the least multilingual as well as the most multilingual states -Kerala and Karnataka respectively - irrespective of the level of education. However, with incremented levels of education, there has been a constant increase in Kerala resulting in over half the population of graduates or above becoming not just bilingual, but trilingual.

5. We need to be aware, however, that the absence of education in the mother tongue, the impact of large global languages and language fatigue are some of the causes that can lead to language extinction too.




